


Agriculture Newsletter

Animal Care Starts with the Calf - January 11, 2022

- Time: 1:00-2:30 p.m.
- Description: Jennifer Van Os will discuss "Successful pair-raising of calves" (+ promo for Feb 22 Well-Being conference). Pair or group housing of calves is growing in popularity due to research showing benefits for calf growth, development, and welfare. This presentation will review best practices to promote good health and welfare in calves raised in pairs or small groups.
- Sylvia Kehoe will speak on: "How can we make disbudding easier?" There are multiple ways to disbud a calf however they all share important characteristics. This presentation will review the advantages and disadvantages of different disbudding methods and the ways we can make this an easy, safe, and effective process for both calves and employees.

Diving Into Dairy Data Projects

Farm Pulse Program, Make Sense of Financial Management - January 21st

- Time: 11:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m.
- Description: Long-term success for a farm business begins with a strong financial foundation. Kevin Bernhardt, Extension Farm Management Specialist and Katie Wantoch, Extension Educator, Dunn County will discuss the Farm Pulse Program, which provides a framework for informed decision-making; making sense of financial information, so you know where to start immediately. Participants are invited to enroll in the Farm Pulse Program to help you evaluate your farm business finances and take the pulse of your business and goals for the future. Other topics in the webinar include an overview of the financial model and the purpose and value of the basic financial statements: Balance Sheet, Income Statement and Statement of Cash Flow.

Don't Gamble the Farm Away, Take Charge of Your Future Today!

- Description: The first step in problem solving is being aware that you have a problem. In the case of risk management, it involves choosing among alternatives that reduce the adverse financial effects of the uncertainties, such as weather, yield, price, government policy, global market, and other factors that can cause wide swings in farm income. In this webinar, Kevin Bernhardt, Extension Farm Management Specialist and Katie Wantoch, Extension Educator, Dunn County will discuss how to define risk and risk management, manage risks, and self-analyze your own tolerance for risk. We will also highlight the process for developing a risk management plan for your farm business.

Who needs BQA?

For a farmer/rancher to fully understand their individual BQA requirement, it is recommended that they visit with their cattle buyers. Auction barns and packing plants in Wisconsin have provided the guidance below.

- Finished/fat cattle: Tyson buyers require farmers to be BQA certified; auction markets are required to have proof of BQA certification and will announce farmer status prior to auctioning cattle. JBS requires that producers selling cattle directly to their plants sign an affidavit stating that they are "in compliance with all applicable state or national BQA certification and verification programs."
- Feeder calves: At this time, there is no BQA requirement for the sale of feeder cattle.
- Cull cows/bulls: JBS requires that producers selling cattle directly to their plants sign an affidavit stating that they are "in compliance with all applicable state or national BQA certification and verification programs."
- Dairy calves: At this time, there is no BQA requirement for the sale of dairy calves. However, the U.S. calf-raising sector now has a voluntary program to help ensure optimal calf health and welfare via the Calf Care & Quality Assurance (CCQA) program. PRIVATE FARM PESTICIDE APPLICATOR TRAINING

Who needs to get certified?

You must be certified if you apply, mix and load, or direct the use of:

- Restricted-use pesticides (RUPs) <https://www.epa.gov/pesticide-worker-safety/restricted-use-products-rup-report>
- Any pesticide on a for-hire basis
- Any pesticide in or on public schools or school grounds (K-12 public schools)
- Any pesticide in aquatic environments (may also be a requirement of permit)

You also must be certified if you:

- Conduct pesticide-safety training for agricultural workers or pesticide handlers as required under the Worker Protection Standard (WPS)
