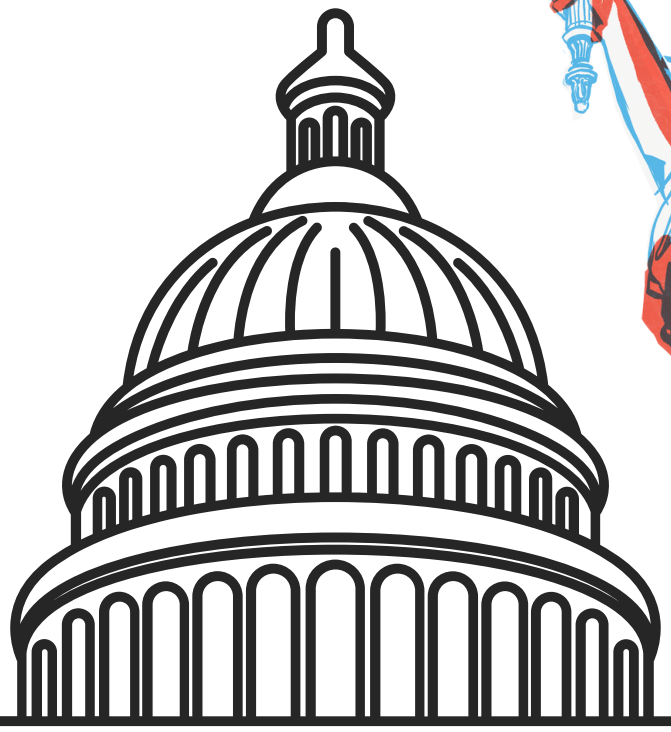
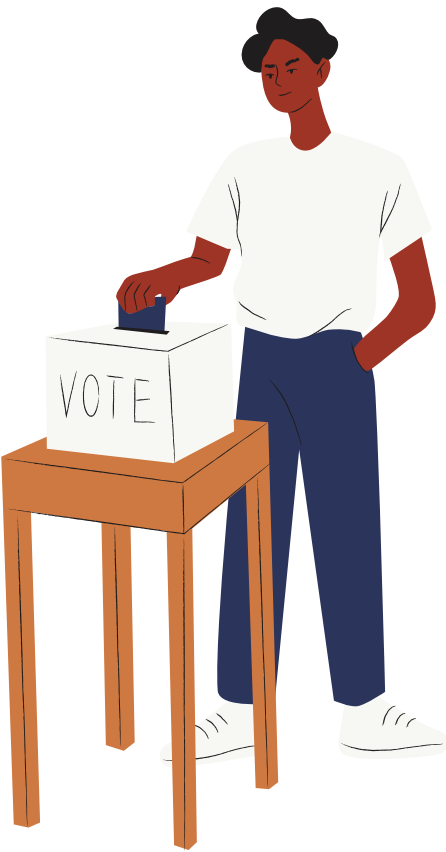

CITIZENSHIP TEST

Anyone who was born in the United States is automatically considered a U.S. citizen and has all the rights of a citizen. Some people, called immigrants, travel to the U.S. for many different reasons. Those that want to also become citizens but were not born here must take a Citizenship Test and pass. This test shows that the immigrants know some general knowledge about the country they are trying to be a citizen of. Some sample questions are below - as a U.S. born citizen, you should know a few of them already. How many questions can you get right?

1. **Why does the flag of the United States have 13 stripes?**
2. **When do we celebrate Independence Day?**
3. **Who lived in America before the Europeans arrived?**
4. **Name one American Indian tribe in the United States**
5. **Where is the Statue of Liberty?**
6. **If the President can no longer serve, who becomes President?**
7. **What is one reason colonists came to America?**
8. **What is one right or freedom from the First Amendment?**
9. **During the cold war, what was the main concern of the United States?**
10. **What is one responsibility that is only for United States citizens?**
11. **We elect a president for how many years?**
12. **What did Susan B. Anthony do for the United States?**
13. **How old do citizens have to be to vote for President?**

Colonists

To seek a political position, such as in Congress.

Diverse

Someone who works for social or political change.

Election

A situation where everyone has the same rights.

Equality

An official song of a group of people or nation.

Jury

A group of people or things that are different from each other.

Every Vote Counts

November is traditionally the "voting month," and many very important positions are up for election this year, including that of the President and Vice President of the United States.

But ALL positions in government are important. They make decisions on behalf of the public who voted them into office. It's important to know who represents your family in local government.

Interview your family and see if they know the answers, and if they don't ask an adult to help you find them!

Do we elect our local sheriff?

When does our city/township/county council or board meet?




YOUR FAIR PROJECT!

- Writing or typing utensil

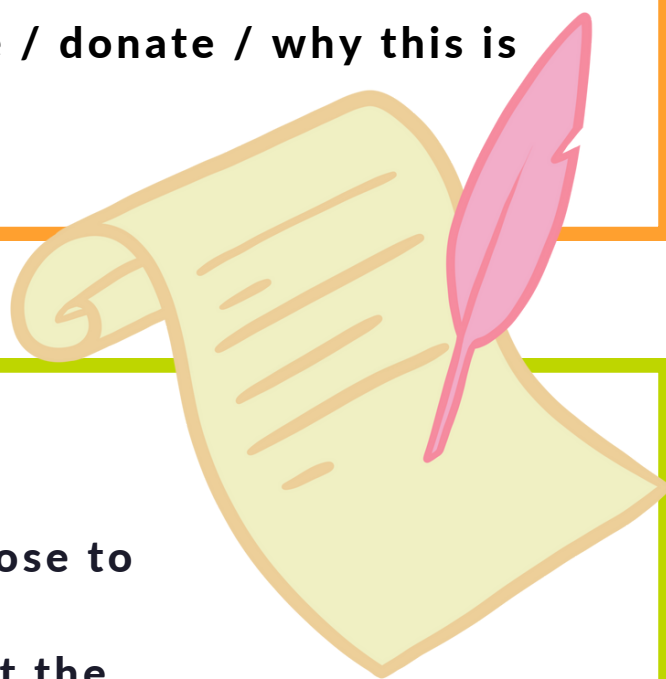
INSTRUCTIONS:
