AFRICAN BANANA FRITTERS

There are different foods that each family, culture, country and even continent hold dear and make through generations. Can you think of any foods that the recipe has been handed down through your family? Try making this recipe below for Banana Fritters which originates from Western Africa, and are popular in the Caribbean as well!

INGREDIENTS

- 1 & 1/4 cups All-Purpose Flour, gluten free if needed
- 1 tsp Salt
- 1/2 cup Sugar
- 3 Ripe Bananas
- 1/3 cup Cooking Oil

INSTRUCTIONS



- 1. With the help of an adult, heat oil in a frying pan over medium-high heat.
- 2.In a medium bowl mash bananas with a fork until chunky, add the sugar, and combine until the sugar has dissolved into the banana.
- 3.In a separate bowl add flour and salt. Pour in the banana mixture and stir well until all the flour is worked in. You will need to use some elbow grease to get everything evenly combined.
- 4. When the oil is hot, have your adult help you scoop in the banana fritter batter (try saying that 10 times fast) by the spoonful. Fry on both sides for 3-5 minutes until brown.
- 5. After frying drain on a paper towel-lined plate. Serve warm. Enjoy!

MANDALA PASTA

Mandalas were created in the 4th century in service of one of the world's largest religions, Buddhism. They were produced in Tibet, India, Nepal, China, Japan, Bhutan, and Indonesia! Mandalas have a therapeutic because when you create them you use repetitive movements and stay focused which leads to mindfulness and being present. Follow the directions below to make your own mandala from colored pasta!

MATERIALS

- Dried Pasta of various shapes and sizes
- Plastic ziploc-type bags
- Rubbing alcohol
- Food Coloring (liquid not gel) OR liquid watercolor paint
- Sturdy paper plates
- Glue



HOW TO MAKE COLORED PASTA

- 1. Place your pasta shapes in the plastic bag, one bag per color.
- 2.Add a tablespoon or so of rubbing alcohol, close the top, and massage the bag to distribute the alcohol.
- 3. Open the bag, add your food coloring or liquid watercolor paint, close the bag again and massage to distribute the color.
- 4. Spread the pasta out on cookie sheets or a wax paper-lined surface to dry.

HOW TO MAKE PASTA MANDALA

- 1. Arrange your pasta on your paper plate, starting with a small design in the middle.
- 2. Continue to make designs that radiate from the center. (see picture above for an idea).
- 3. Mandalas are all about balance and symmetry, so keep that in mind while making your design but make it your own!
- 4.Once you have your design finalized, you can glue your pasta in place to keep it forever.

FAIR PROJECT! PAPER LANTERN (SIMPLE ART OR CRAFT)

Paper lanterns came from ancient China originally! First used for religious purposes, they later became adopted by various Asian cultures to symbolize joy, prosperity, and good fortune.



Materials:

- Colored Paper
- Scissors
- Pencil
- Stapler
- Adult!

Directions:

- 1. Have an adult help you cut two strips down the long side of one of the sheets of the paper and then set aside.
- 2. Fold the second sheet of paper in half to form a long skinny rectangle. Draw pencil marks as a guide to cut from the folded edge almost to the other side but don't cut through the whole paper!
- 3. Unfold and then roll this paper until both ends meet and staple it into place! This is the outside of the lantern!
- 4. Now roll up that first sheet of paper and insert into the lantern, and staple into place.
- 5. You can use the two strips cut off the first piece to decorate, or decorate any other way you'd like!

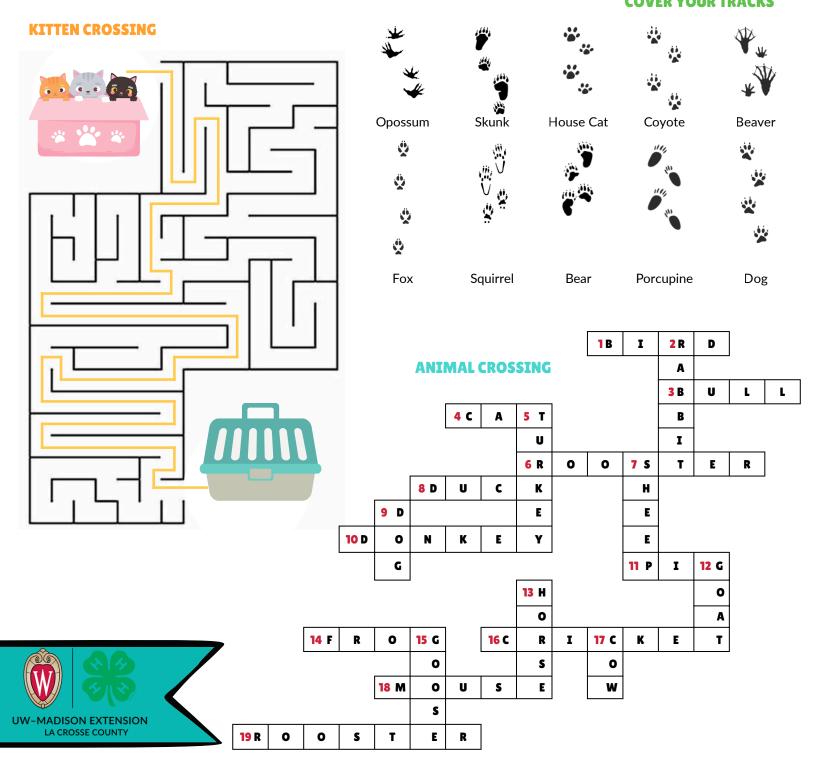
Some things to consider:
